Our Purpose

To save lives, create great Australians and build better communities

The origins of Surf Life Saving can be traced back to the actions of Mr William Gocher at Manly Beach in September 1902, defying the law of the time by bathing during prohibited hours (daylight). His and similar actions by other people forced the recognition of daylight bathing and the pastime of surfing became part of our national culture.

As surf bathing grew in popularity, its dangers just as rapidly became apparent. Small groups of experienced and regular surfers began to form themselves into lifesaving bodies to assist those who required to be rescued from an unfamiliar environment.

As these clubs grew in size and numbers, the need for a united front to raise funds and seek assistance from local and state government resulted in the New South Wales Surf Bathing Association being formed on 18 October 1907.

The Surf Life Saving Central Coast Branch was formed in October 1938 at a meeting with the 5 original Central Coast surf clubs: The Entrance, Terrigal, Avoca Beach, Killcare and Ocean Beach.

At that time, Surf Life Saving was growing at a rapid rate and the administration requirements were becoming a burden on the head State Centre. The leaders from the five founding clubs also recognised the need with the growing population on the Central Coast and increased demands at the beaches.

After the establishment of the Branch there was a temporary holt in the further advancement of Surf Life Saving during the years of World War II before renewed growth slowly accelerated and the other fifteen (15) affiliated clubs on the Central Coast were formed finishing with North Entrance SLSC in 1977.

Since this time Surf Life Saving has been embraced by the Central Coast community and gone from strength to strength with our operations.

On record we have saved 33,889 Lives since 1977, but it is fair to say that over 50,000 people in danger have been rescued by our courageous and dedicated red and yellow army of volunteers on the Central Coast.

President's Report



Surf Life Saving Central Coast once again carried out our core duties of Lifesaving on our fifteen beaches with excellence. Our members rose to the occasion, with some enormous obstacles thrown our way.

Never in my history of being associated with Surf Life Saving, have I seen a season deliver so many curve balls. From evacuation orders from all beaches for Tsunami warnings (15 th of January), restrictions on who can patrol due to Covid 19, inclement weather producing some massive seas and who will forget the colour and the contamination of the water after some of the many storms that hit the entire NSW coastline. It was reported that a fully intact roof of a house/shed was floating off the coast out from Copacabana with its satellite dish still attached.

Lifesaving

Our Patrolling members were on the beaches week in, week out and Public Holidays looking after the vast numbers of visitors to our beautiful beaches. The amount of people on the beaches swelled again due to international travel restrictions. Crowds flocked in and around our coastline, visiting many beaches that are unpatrolled making our Support Services teams busy.

Our Lifesaving operations are always excelling and I am proud to say we deliver a very professional group of well-educated and experienced Lifesavers who work tirelessly in the prevention of drownings.

The number of preventive actions was a massive number again and the number of rescues carried out was on the rise. Some of these rescues gained State and National recognition and these members are congratulated for their dedication and skill in and around the surf.

The Flood response in and around the Central Coast saw a skilled group of our Members deployed to assist in rescuing people from inundated flood affected homes, delivering much needed supplies and door knocking to carry out health checks on flood affected residents. This work went well beyond our normal duties and at times stretched some of our Lifesaving Teams.

Governance

The Directors of SLSCC led their teams with skill and commitment and we once again excelled across the service. We have seen our membership statistics increase across the board. This trend is absolutely amazing and bucks the trend to what we are seeing in other Branches across the State. There is still much work here to be done. Revitalising and a re-think on how we deliver our programs has started and needs to continue if we are to succeed and stay relevant to our communities.

With the curve balls that were thrown at us this past season we also had the Central Coast Council go into administration with the entire group of Councillors sacked. Funding was put in jeopardy, there was much uncertainty with the future of our association with our Council, but I am pleased to say that we worked through the many issues, we received our much-needed support financially from Central Coast Council and we are happy with the progress we have seen over the last 6 to 8 months.

Recognition

To our Sponsors and Supporters, I once again thank you from all of our Members. Your association makes our job that little bit easier and your financial contribution makes our beaches a whole lot safer.

Congratulations to David Unger (who did not seek re-election at the election meeting.) David has been the Director of Sport for the past 12 years and it must be said, David has committed a big part of his life to Surf Life Saving. To David - our members, our surf sports participants, thank you for all your work over these many years.

To our 15 Club Presidents - what a year! We thought the season 20/21 was difficult; most of us nowhave mastered Zoom and that was a challenge for some. Your commitment in leading and directing your Clubs does at times goes unnoticed, but from SLSCC and the entire community who visit our beaches...thankyou.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank our CEO, Jon Harkness, and his team at the Office at Tuggerah. Jon is a dedicated, hardworking colleague and delivers on the day to day operations of our Business with all areas of Surf Life Saving. Thanks Jon and thanks to your team

I will finish this report by saying this is my last report as President of Surf Life Saving Central Coast. I have been in the role as President for the past 12 years and some years before that as Director in a number of Portfolios. Surf has been, and still is, an enormous part of my life and I would like to thank all members past and present for the opportunity to lead Surf Life Saving Central Coast. Many emotions come my way when I think about the history of my involvement in Surf which are too many to list, but I will say I am extremely proud of what we have achieved over the many years and

It's It's a pleasure to present the 84th Surf Life Saving Central Coast (SLSCC) Annual Report for 2021/2022.

The past year was again an unprecedented year with disruption and impact of the COVID 19 pandemic. Despite this we managed to deliver lifesaving, surf sports, education and member activities. Some of these were modified to meet the needs of controls in place around distancing, however were overall a complete success of delivery of core activities. Disappointingly, one cancelation outside of our control for the year was our Community Education Program, which traditionally reaches thousands of school aged students. Despite this 2022 community education programs are fully booked in anticipation of surf survival, school talks and beach fun days.

Strategic Reflection

The SLSCC Central Coast strategic plan is evolving with many workshops completed to align the SLSA and SLSNSW draft template. This plan is scheduled to be completed in the 2022/2023 season with further engagement from the Branch Council. The existing strategy has been delivered upon within the constrained environment in all portfolios.

Governance

Role of the Board of SLSCC

The role of the Board is to be responsible to the membership base around relevance and sustainability of Surf Life Saving Central Coast.

The Board meets monthly to report individual portfolios at a strategic level, to deliver on its objectives and goals. The board is ultimately responsible for the delivery of all activities of the organisation and controls governance. They regularly review and discuss policy to ensure relevance to the clubs it serves.

The board is made of six elected members who have exposure in their specified portfolios and are considered to be the subject matter experts in this area.

The board also present to the Branch Council on a bi-monthly basis.

Role of Branch Council

The Branch Council is made up of the Club Presidents from each of the Central Coasts clubs. It holds bi-monthly meetings along with the annual election meeting and annual general meeting.

The Branch Council are responsible for ensuring the board represents clubs effectively with relevant information and guidance to meet the needs of the diverse range of clubs.

The Branch Council is responsible for the following":-

- · Election of Board of Directors
- Review of actions from Board to ensure relevance and sustainability of the organisation
- Provides the voice of the membership of clubs across the Central Coast

- Review of management reports and financial position of branch.
- Assist the board and/or CEO in their thoughts on the direction of the organisation and manage policy changes that affect the membership base.

Relationship with Management

The management of the Branch is completed under the supervision of the Chief Executive Officer (CEO). The CEO is responsible to the board for all decisions affecting the delegated management.

The CEO is responsible for the operations of SLSCC and has authority for decisions around implementation of the strategy, whilst being aligned to the Board and their directive. The CEO has close working relationship with the board members, meeting monthly with further dialogue and close working relationship with Branch President.

Central Coast Council Partnership

Surf Life Saving Central Coast (SLSCC) has enjoyed a long and successful ongoing partnership with Central Coast Council which has allowed for the development and growth of Surf Life Saving on the Central coast and the 15 Central Coast Clubs over many years.

The Central Coast Council and SLSCC have a unique relationship where Central Coast Council patrol beaches during the season Monday to Friday and SLSCC and its clubs patrol weekends and public holidays. This situation allows both organisations a situation where they retain relevance and ability to perform duties to the ultimate capacity. The partnership also creates great efficiencies with the joint share of vital lifesaving equipment and fleet of the latest rescue water craft (jet skis). This situation ensures both organisations are funded and supported with equipment at all times, especially in times of emergency and emergency equipment requirements.

The working relationship with Central Coast Council lifeguards and SLSCC is

the best and healthiest it has ever been and allows for seamless operations for the community at the 15 patrolled locations and unpatrolled locations both in standard patrolling hours and outside. Key focus areas over the past 12 months have been the notorious blackspots of The Entrance channel, Spoon Bay and Snapper Cave in Lake Munmorah National Park.

Central Coast Council continues to support the maintenance on the 15 clubs in conjunction with the SLSCC which ensures our surf clubs are protected against the harsh conditions of being on the beach front.

With the ongoing support of the Central Coast Council, SLSCC is able to provide many activities which support community education. Unfortunately, in the 2021/2022 season some of our programs were unable to run due to the pandemic, however are returning 2022 with vigor. SLSCC will be actively delivering the following activities to support our joint community:

Surf Fun Day Program

An "on the beach" program designed for primary school children delivered during school terms 4 at Toowoon Bay, Terrigal and Umina Beaches. The program teaches children surf safety and sun protection whilst also showing them how to enjoy the beach in safety through participation in a mixture of activities.

Beach Safe Program

Designed for children from pre-school age to primary school, the Beach Safe program comprises an in class 40 minutes lecture on aquatic surf safety and awareness.

Finally in the 2021/2022 season the support given by Central Coast Council enabled SLSCC to provide to its club's significant investment in equipment used in the activities of lifesaving which has provided great benefit to both the clubs and community.

We look forward to the upcoming season and many more to come working within the realms of this best practice relationship, which is the envy of many other branches and councils up and down the eastern coastline of NSW.








RESINC Rip Demonstration

Over the season, with the support and funding from RESINC Solar, Surf Life Saving Central Coast were able to deliver rip demonstrations to the membership base and community.

These demonstrations were conducted by professional instructors in conjunction with patrols and rookies on beaches where there is continued risk of being caught in rips and in the notorious channel at The Entrance.

The demonstrations use highly visible dye used in the water, which is also used in search and rescue exercises by lifesavers, showing the volume of water, direction of rip and where it ends. There is also commentary and live rescue scenarios conducted displaying how to act if caught in the rip.

These demonstrations are a vital education piece to ensure that the members of the public have the opportunity learn and understand what to do if caught in a rip and were a highly popular and visible activity.





Community Partnerships

Community partnerships are paramount support for Surf Life Saving Central Coast. SLSCC has been fortunate over the years to have local organisations continually choosing to invest in the organisations to give back to the locals and visitors to the coast.

Despite the difficult challenges faced by everyone in the past financial year, a key highlight was the renewal of a long-term major partnership with Newcastle Permanent Building society for another three-year period with further options. This is an amazing partnership that has been in existence on the Central Coast for some 19 years and supports our junior activities along with Newcastle Permanent Junior Life Saver of the Year, Newcastle Permanent Youth Development Programs and the highly competitive Newcastle Permanent Ironperson series.

In 2021 a new three-year partnership with long term supporters RESINC Solar was established This enabled SLSCC to deliver 11 public rip demonstrations displaying the dangers of rips, how they operate and what to do if caught in a rip. It is also pleasing to continue the strong relationship held with Freemasons on the Central Coast who have a keen interest in supporting youth sports and developing young adults. Whilst this was the final year of this relationship, new agreements have subsequently been executed to support similar programs along with the SLSCC Rookie Program. This expansion of support is a natural fit for the offerings and we look forward to delivery of Rookie programs in the coming years Mingara Recreation club has been pivotal in many ways with support over the past season. During the pandemic their support has been unwavering with pool hire, financial support for education programs and the amazing support they give for the biggest member recognition event on the Central Coast, being our annual Awards of Excellence, which is held in the Mingara ballroom.

Black Spot Awareness Program

Surf Life Saving Central Coast is proud to be able to be able to keep the Central Coast community safe at our patrolled beaches. However, each season our 15 clubs and Support Operators regularly respond to incidents which are away from our patrolled area.

The pandemic brought its unique challenges, one being an increase in beach visitation across the entire coastline and another an increase in the number of people moving to the Central Coast. These factors, on top of the limited availability of parking at a patrolled location, meant more and more visitors were exploring unpatrolled locations. These observations from our members are backed up by the Annual Coastal Water Safety released by SLSA, where in the 2020/21 report, it was noted that over 50% of all drownings occurred within 5km from a patrolled location.

This risk was also identified in the Water Safety Strategy 2030. This publication outlines Australia's National Water Safety till 2030. The aim of the strategy is to reduce drownings by 50% by 2030. Our Black Spot Community education program directly relates to one of the six Coastal Water Strategies outlined within the report - identifying black spot locations and implementing drowning prevention programs to mitigate known risks.

With beaches anticipated to have record numbers of visitors again, our volunteer lifesavers saw an opportunity to engage with visitors and provide valuable water safety education about where they are swimming. The biggest benefit of the Black Spot Program is it provides highly local and tangible knowledge about the unpatrolled location and how to stay safe in and around the water.

The feedback received whilst delivering this water safety message was very positive from the volunteer lifesavers on patrol as they found it as an opportunity to open a conversation about the dangers of the location without having to lecture the members of the public. At Pearl Beach the program has been so well received by the local community, that they run regular water talks for the community, using the Pearl Beach brochure.

Support Operations 2021-2022

The support operations team consists of our Duty Officers and Rescue Water Craft Operators (RWC).

Our Branch Duty Officers are a dedicated team of highly experienced lifesavers, who patrolled 859 hours over the patrol season. This team does an amazing amount of work for SLSCC and our 15 clubs. These members not only dedicate many hours for their own Surf Clubs, they also contribute at Branch and at a State level. The Duty Officers attend all major incidents, in and out of season, after hours and work closely with Police and other emergency services coordinating SLS assets in Search and Rescue situations. This season the team consisted of 18 x Duty Officers who delivered the following: -

- 816.5 patrol hours, which doesn't include approx. 100 hours (combined) contributed assisting with the 2 flood events in February / March & June.
- 59 x 13SURF incidents of which 6 were high priority response outside of patrolled locations.

We also welcomed three new probationary Duty Officers in Erin Clarke, Matthew Calbert & Anthony Jones. Our RWC team have again excelled in their operations responding to callouts outside of patrol hours & away from patrolled locations. This team is highly skilled and trained to the highest level enabling this vital role to deliver outstanding service to the community they serve.

A major highlight this in 2021/2022 has been the recognition at national level of Lynette Vuradin of Shelly Beach, as an SLSA medal recipient on her first patrol and as part of the Avoca Beach mass rescue in January 2022.

For the Branch Duty Officers and RWC Operators it is a big ask being away from their families for multiple days & these members also patrol at their respective clubs, which displays incredible commitment and professionalism.

Thank you to Katie Dixon, Arron Camp, Warren Evrard, Stuart Harvey, Graham Sherer & Shanan White who have all decided to take a step back from their Duty Officer roles for personal or other reasons. Your service over the many years along with your vast knowledge & experience will be greatly missed.

This season we had 57 RWC Operators covering the coastline of the Central Coast from Munmorah National Park in the north to Umina in the south. The team also trained 7 new operators in the off season ready for the 2022/2023 season.





Branch Pool Rescue Program

Since the early 2000's Surf Life Saving Central Coast has been introducing and developing members in Pool Rescue through the Annual Pool Challenge event.

Prior to COVID in 2019 the first pool rescue clinic was hosted by our club pool coaches who continued to engage junior members throughout and develop their skills for the State and National Championships. Throughout the pandemic the team continued to expand the program to include a clinic and a Branch Championships and in 2021 we hosted the only pool rescue carnival within NSW.

Pool Rescue events, while unique, have a very real lifesaving element to them. The events look like swimming races until competitors dive down and surface with a manikin or stand on the blocks with fins and tubes tied to them. All these additional elements to these swimming events bring to life how lifesavers perform real life rescues in all bodies of water.

Due to its unique nature, it provides our members with an interest in continuing to develop as lifesavers and maintain their swimming fitness throughout the winter period which assists them as they progress to their next award or their next rescue incident.

Each season our coaches host a clinic held at the start of the winter season to re-introduce the sport and develop club coaches as they transition back to the pool environment. The clinics have four rotations which focus on a specific skill of pool rescue, whether it is carrying a manikin by their side, towing a manikin, diving with fins and tube or throwing a rope.

The Branch Championships provide Central Coast athletes the opportunity to practice their skills in a racing environment before competing at the State and National Championships. Since the first carnival, which was held in 2019 as a development competition for clinic participants, the carnival has continued to grow in events and athlete participation.

Throughout the entire program the lead coaches have continued to develop athletes, new coaches and officials within the sport. Through this process the program has seen our coaches develop to become SLSNSW Head Pool Rescue Coach, officials progress from junior to senior roles and multiple athletes making the NSW team.

This development progress is a crucial indicator of success as the Central Coast continues to lead NSW in this unique sport, we call Pool Rescue.







SLSCC Flood Response 2022

SLSCC 2022 Flood Response
In February 2022 an intense rain band
formed across the eastern seaboard.
This weather system brought an enormous
amount of rain in a very short period of
time causing flooding across various
regions of NSW. Our own SLSCC
volunteer lifesavers were deployed to
the Shoalhaven district in preparation
for a flood emergency as the weather
forecast predicted this area would be
heavily impacted by the torrential
downfall. These lifesavers spent over
48 hours assisting in the flood response
efforts.

Within the same window of time the forecast changed and began moving up the coast to impact the areas of Western Sydney, Central Coast and Hunter Valley. Our second team of volunteer lifesavers were tasked with assisting in door knocking and evacuations in low lying areas of Tuggerah Lakes. Our lifesavers also assisted in completing rapid building damage assessments with NSW Fire and Rescue.

A third team of lifesavers were then tasked to assist in the Hunter Valley between Singleton and Maitland as floodwaters rose in this area assisting in evacuations, transportation and re-supply of food, water and medication.

The next deployments were to Wisemans Ferry, Lower Portland, St Albans, Laughtondale, Gunderman and Spencer areas where our lifesavers were tasked with assisting SES and the ADF again with welfare checks, re-supply of food, water, medical assistance and medication.

In these weather events the logistics and tasking of all our Surf Life Saving assets originate from the Sydney SES Headquarters at Rhodes. Due to the longevity and involvement of Surf Life Saving in responding to this weather event some of our senior lifesaving members were deployed to the SES Headquarters where they assisted the co-ordination and deployment of volunteer lifesavers in the Camden and Liverpool areas.

As our members were cleaning up and recovering from this major natural disaster another intense rain band formed over the eastern seaboard in May. This time Western Sydney and the Hunter Valley were impacted and our members were tasked once again to support the SES in the Tuggerah Lakes, Spencer and Gunderman areas. Their assistance continued over 5 days with tasking such as welfare checks, re-supply of food, water, medication and medical assistance.

Some members of our Surf Life Saving Family in the Far North Coast branch lost everything in the February – March flood event and my thoughts go out to these members and their families as they rebuild their lives and homes.

I would like to thank all of our Surf Life Saving Central Coast members who assisted in both flood events. Surf Life Saving comes under Emergency Services as an organisation, but we must remember that Surf Life Saving is a "Support Agency" to the "Combat Agencies". E.G Police, Fire, Ambulance, RFS and SES.

Our Season Highlights

Members from across the Central Coast assisted with flood response across the Hunter and Hawkesbury area in the February Floods.

Zero lives lost between the flags for the season

The RWC team consist of 62 operators in total with 8 new operators inducted into the team, including now three female operators. 28 Support Operators across the coast.

Conducted Patrol audit/competition between clubs for education and best practice purpose.

Our Trainers, Assessors and Facilitators completed 9222 education awards being gained (this includes junior awards) and 5712 members completed 9006 annual skills maintenance requirements.

SLSCC implemented a strategy to train all 580 ART holders in the new First Aid Units and ART upgrade. This strategy will result in the branch seeing 4 new First Aid Facilitators

SLSCC ran Mental Health First Aid Courses for its members. The branch trained over 50 new mental health first aiders.

SLSCC has been a strong advocate and worked closely with SLSLNSW to establish a new operating rhythm for TAF pathways. This has resulted in quarterly courses now being offered for both new trainers and assessors.

Surf Sports completed 13 carnivals trialing different short sharp programs for juniors. Three rounds of the Newcastle Permanent Iron person series.

In competition, Central Coast Competitors won 5 Australia Open Medals, 18 Australian Masters Medals, 2 Australian Youth Medals.

Branch held Pool Rescue development and Branch Championships on the Central Coast.

Held 4 Youth Activations and Leadership programs for uder13 to under 19's including a camp to Pacific Palms staying two nights at the Surf Club.

Eight clubs ran inclusive nipper programs support with equipment and tents from SLSCC. Branch inclusive nipper carnival held in February at Avoca.

Renewal of community partnership in February to support the purchase of a Branch ISUZU support vehicle to enhance the fleet to deliver support across the geographic footprint and community education.

Commenced "Black Spot" education between clubs extending services to unpatrolled locations across the coast educating public on the dangers in these locations. This included brochures of hazards promoting community safety.

- Wamberal Whales. Thanks to Bronwyn and Matilda Maley and the huge group that turn up every Sunday to help these children.












Garry's initial involvement within SLS was with nippers in 1991. Over the years, he has held numerous positions and was the branch delegate for the 'Board of Junior Activities' from 1994 to 2002. After his tenure on the junior board, he became Club President at Avoca. He spent a significant number of years coordinating junior branch and branch carnivals and was a surf sports official for many of these years.

He has been an influential member of SLSCC Branch Council for the 20 years of his club presidency. He is Avoca SLSC's longest serving president in their rich club history. He has been a Patrol Captain for the vast amount of his patrolling years. From the inception of Surfguard in 2005, Garry has recorded 1,300 patrol hours. This figure would be closer to the 2,000 hour mark in total, as many of Garry's hours in the early years haven't been recorded. Garry is always available to fill in for Patrol Captains or when the club needs extra patrol members on the beach. Garry has been instrumental in organising and patrolling at struggling clubs when required with numerous days done at both The Entrance and North Entrance SLSC's.

In his first year of being a member, Garry attained his Training Officers Certificate, and continues to be a Trainer and Assessor. He conducts training courses for SRC, bronze, first aid and ARTC each year. As a teacher, it is evident that he thrives on teaching people, as he is involved in every course put through Avoca SLSC. Each year he works with schools, instructing teachers through their bronze medallions and completing their proficiencies. At a branch level, Garry has facilitated numerous courses including Silver Medallion Beach Management for members of all clubs across the Central Coast.

Garry has organized some major events for Avoca SLSC each year, including the Rocks-to-Rocks Swim, our Door Knock Appeal and Annual Golf Day.

He participates in these events, often doing countless hours, filling in gaps when we are short of numbers.

Garry works tirelessly preparing for the club presentation night, producing slide and video shows of our competitors along with ordering all the gifts and prizes for the members. Garry's love for Avoca and SLSCC is evident in the way he has conducted himself over the years.

His temperament when dealing with people and situations has held him in good esteem with our members and staff. He cares about people and it shows up in the effort he puts into making Avoca SLSC an enjoyable place for all our members.

Garry has contributed to the betterment of SLSCC in many ways. He has been actively involved with the introduction of the UAV service in 2019, completing volunteer patrols for SLSNSW with the UAV service.

Garry is highly regarded by his peers in Surf Life Saving and often his advice is sought from fellow club directors and staff.

As part of the Branch Council for 20 years Garry has been an amazing administrator, keeping abreast of the changing times with promoting new technology and has ensured Avoca is in good stead for years to come



Brett Beswick New Life Member

Brett has been a patrolling member in Surf Life Saving for over 30 years. Starting his career at the iconic Brett held a number of positions on lifesaving executive board including IRB Captain, Club Vice captain and Chief Instructor and in 1986/87 Brett was awarded Patrol captain of year. In 2001 he moved to Avoca SLSC where he has and continues to provide exceptional service to Avoca in Lifesaving.

In the beginning Brett was actively involved in the Avoca Beach Nippers as an age manager and Water Safety Captain for many years while his grew up within the program. Also at this time Brett continued to follow his passion and assist in various aspects of lifesaving at Avoca. It wasn't long till Brett was entrenched in the Surf Life Saving movement on the Central Coast and he was appointed as Central Coast Director of Lifesaving where he held this position for 10 years stepping down in 2019/20 season.

Over his tenure as Director of Lifesaving Brett oversaw various new initiatives and programs which have significantly enhanced lifesaving on the Central Coast. The programs include RWC teams, callout teams, implementation of Patrol Agreements for SLSNSW and UAVs to name a few. Alongside these initiative Brett continued to ensure all surf clubs were ready for the season ahead with gear and equipment inspections and ensuring all clubs had enough patrols to patrol the beach from October to April each season.

He has worked with the Central Coast Council to advocate for the organisation to maintain a strong working partnership.

Brett epitomizes what we are about in the movement and has dedicated his life to Surf Life Saving. He has contributed over 1,600 hours as a patrol person and this does not account for the many hours in roles as Director at Club, Branch and State level. His roles listed probably do not reflect all the duties he has undertaken.

Brett's contributions have been acknowledged in a number of areas. RWC Operator of The Year, Presidents Award and 2009-10, Volunteer of The Year at Branch. Brett has also been actively involved for many years in Club 13SURF as a callout team member, and involved winning several SLSNSW Rescue of month awards. Brett was also a member of the Branch Executive that won 5 SLSNSW Branch of the Year awards, over his 10 years as Director of Lifesaving SLSCC.



Beris Meldrum New Life Member

Beris first joined Terrigal in 1989, and has been an iconic figure in Central Coast Surf Life Saving for decades. Whether running courses, serving as an official, assisting in many other ways at Carnivals or even helping with administrative tasks generally, Beris has always striven to build, nurture, and enhance Surf Lifesaving, especially in the general community.

The appearance of her cheerful reassuring figure cheerful reassuring figure has encouraged many a young Lifesaver in the sport and has added to the strength of the Central Coast as a branch.

Beris has been heavily involved in Education, training and officiating after she got her first SLS awardsover 25 years ago in 1994 (Radio, Resuscitation, Officials L1) and her first training awards in 1996 (Radio Instructor and Training Officer Resuscitation). In Education she has been an examiner since 2005, Age Manager Coordinator delivering courses prior to e-learning was available and assists in annual proficiencies each season. In Surf Sports Beris has been officiating since 1996 in various positions.

In 2020 she was awarded her 20 years Officiating Service Certificate. Beris also assisted in these other positions throughout the years, Lifesaving Equipment Manager, Membership and recognition committee, office administrator at the branch office, sat on the JLOTY Panel for 3 years and was part of the testing committee who brought in Surfguard.

Beris has been an active volunteer for SLSCC for approximately 25 years. She has contributed across all areas of Surf Life Saving with sustained service in the areas of Education, Member Services and Officiating. This includes many years or Education and Member Services support back at the time when the SLSCC "Districts' model was in place and Beris was heavily involved in District 3 that included Wamberal, Terrigal and North Avoca.



Notes To The Financial Statements For The Financial Year Ended 30 June 2022

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009, the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012, the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and associated regulations. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Surf Life Saving Central Coast Incorporated is an association registered under the *Associations Incorporations Act 2009* and domiciled in New South Wales.

The financial report, except for the cash flow information have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

These are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purpose of complying with the *Australian Charites and Not-for-profits Commissions Act 2012* and associated regulations. The Executive Committee have determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members of the Surf Life Saving Central Coast Inc.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the AASB and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements'; AASB 107 'Statement of Cash Flows'; AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors'; AASB 1048 'Interpretations of Standards'; AASB 1054 'Australian Additional Disclosures' as appropriate for not-for-profit oriented entities.

Accounting Policies

Critical Accounting Estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the incorporated association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in note 2.

Revenue

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the company and the revenue can be reliably measured.

Sale of goods

Sale of goods revenue is recognised at the point of sale, which is when the customer takes receipt of the goods, the risks and rewards are transferred to the customer and there is a valid sales contract. Amounts disclosed as revenue are net of sales returns and discounts.

Functions and Events

Revenue from functions and events are recognised once the event is held and the has meet its obligations to provide an event, function or venue for the expressed purpose agreed with the parties.

Grants and donations

Grant and donation revenue is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income when the College obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the Association and the amount of the grant or donation can be measured reliability. If conditions are attached to the grant or donation which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Notes To The Financial Statements For The Financial Year Ended 30 June 2022

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Revenue (continued)

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any provision for impairment. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

Collectability of trade receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts which are known to be uncollectable are written off by reducing the carrying amount directly. A provision for impairment of trade receivables is raised when there is objective evidence that the incorporated association will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Financial Instruments

Recognition

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the company commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted). Financial instruments are initially measured at cost which includes transaction costs when the related contractual rights or obligations exist. Subsequent to initial recognition these instruments are measured as set out below.

Financial assets

Financial assets that are within the scope of the accounting standards are required to be subsequent measured at amortised or fair value on the basis of the company's business model for managing financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. The company holds investment classified as financial asset at fair value through other comprehensive income. In adopting AASB9 Financial Instruments, the company has made an irrevocable election on initial recognition to present gains and losses on investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading in other comprehensive income. No further impairment of the financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income will be recognised.

Financial liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities are recognised at amortised cost, comprising original debt less principal payments and amortisation.

Where there is an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date, the loans and borrowings are classified as non-current.

Notes To The Financial Statements For The Financial Year Ended 30 June 2022

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Plant and Equipment / Surf Patrol Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised in the profit or loss as revaluation decreases if the impairment losses relate to the revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, including buildings and capitalised improvements, plant and equipment and motor vehicles is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The useful lives estimated for each class of depreciable asset are:

Buildings 20 years
Plant and Equipment 3-10 years
Motor Vehicles 5-8 years

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and if appropriate, adjusted at the end of each reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period that remain unpaid at the end of the reporting period. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised for legal and constructive obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable the incorporated association will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Amount recognised is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the obligation at reporting date, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. If the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate specific to the liability. The increase in the provision resulting from the passage of time is recognised as a finance cost.

Employee Benefits

Short-Term employee Benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Notes To The Financial Statements For The Financial Year Ended 30 June 2022

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Employee Benefits

Other Long-Term Employee Benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and period of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

Fair Value Measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date and assumes that the transaction will take place either in the principal market or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included in other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

2. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumption that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

Provision for impairment of receivables

The level of provision is assessed by considering recent sales experience, the ageing of receivables, historical collection rates and specific knowledge of the individual debtor's financial position.

Provision for impairment of inventories

The provision is assessed by considering recent sales experience, the ageing of inventories and other factors affecting obsolescence.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

Estimated useful lives, related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment could vary as a result of technical innovations or some other event and where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written down.

Notes To The Financial Statements For The Financial Year Ended 30 June 2022

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Impairment of non-financial assets

Impairment is assessed by evaluating conditions specific to the asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined.

Employee benefits provision

Liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.


